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#LifeAfterDaesh Progress highlights in Iraq and Syria

SOUTHWEST ASIA – The Combined Joint Task Force-Operation Inherent Resolve and its partners remain united in a long-term, international mission to create enduring security in Iraq and Northeast Syria to enable stabilization activities and humanitarian assistance.

The old Erbil-Kirkuk road was re-opened on January 8, 2021. The road connects the city of Qushtapa with two surrounding refugee camps. The connection between the city and the camp is considered to be a vital element to attract potential investment.

The restoration of the road is part of the second Local Government Resilience Program (LOGOREP II). A program funded by the Government of Netherlands and implemented by Association of Netherlands Municipalities (VNG), the Danish Refugee Council (DRC) and the authorities in Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KRI).

The road contributes to the programs broader purpose of connecting humanitarian aid and development in the long term.

Future activities should lead to better access of host communities, internally displaced people (IDPs) and refugees and allow them job opportunities and basic services.

A group of Syrian refugees in the Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KRI) are getting the confidence boost they need to secure the financial future of their families through the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) entrepreneurship training program.

The program, funded by the Austrian Development Agency, includes training in analyzing their personal skills, assessing market needs, developing strategies to reach targets, and financial management. The goal is for the participants to be able to run their own small businesses.

At the end of the program, they will also receive some financial assistance to purchase equipment or supplies for their new or existing businesses.



Throughout 2020, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Iraq, in coordination with the Hamdaniyah Directorate of Education, conducted "Back to School" campaign activities in Qaraqosh and the surrounding areas, as well as other vulnerable communities in Qaraqosh. The campaign, with the theme "Education Revival and Community Recovery", was launched at the beginning of the previous academic year; 11 primary schools were targeted and 2,795 students benefited from the campaign activities.

The campaign focused on reaching different communities with diverse ethnic makeup and a large population of returnees. The activities ran under the campaign included painting sessions, theater, and the distribution of campaign packages, all of which reached over 2,000 students.

"Over the past year, 360,696 square meters of land have been cleared of mines and explosives. Some 7,300 explosives parts and devices, and 1,172 mines have been extracted by our agency," said Jabar Mustafa, head of the Kurdistan Region's Mine Action Agency (IKMAA).

Supported by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) Iraq, 87 religious leaders from Erbil, Baghdad, Anbar, and Ninawa attended an eight-day online training session marking the end of a challenging 2020, and a universal period of hope for good things to come in the year ahead. Over six different religious sects were represented, including Sunni and Shiite Muslim, Christian, Yazidism, Sabian Mandaeism, Zoroastrianism, Yarsanism, and Bahai.

The training included peacebuilding workshops focusing on enhancing dialogue, creative expression, coexistence during the COVID-19 pandemic, and the role of Iraqi women in building peace. It also helped religious leaders to disseminate accurate information about COVID-19 to the public and improve the skills necessary for implementation of community peace initiatives.

A coexistence network will be established among the trained religious leaders to foster dialogue, coexistence, and tolerance among communities in close coordination with the 24 local peace committees supported by UNDP across the country.
