#LifeAfterDaesh Progress highlights in Iraq and Syria

SOUTHWEST ASIA – The Combined Joint Task Force-Operation Inherent Resolve and its partners remain united in a long-term, international mission to create enduring security in Iraq and northeast Syria to enable stabilization activities and humanitarian assistance.

Syria's prolonged conflict has left two-thirds of the country's population in need.

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID)'s humanitarian and stabilization assistance is providing critical support to help meet urgent needs and empower the people of Syria to plan for a brighter future.

Ten years of war in Syria has forced millions to flee their country, with an estimated 5.6 million Syrians currently displaced to neighboring countries.

The USAID's humanitarian assistance reaches nearly five million people each month across all of Syria's 14 provinces.

In addition, the USAID is providing food assistance to Syrian refugees and the communities that are generously hosting them throughout the region.

Through vouchers and cash transfers that can be redeemed for food in local markets, the USAID is ensuring more than one million vulnerable people have enough to eat each month, while supporting host communities' local economies. https://twitter.com/USAIDSavesLives/status/1369284678 851629057

As part of its work to support durable solutions for IDPs, returnees, and host communities, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Iraq is reconstructing 261 houses in Ninawa and Anbar provinces using an owner-driven, cash-based model. More than 80% of these homes were completely destroyed before the IOM Iraq's intervention and 40% of beneficiaries are vulnerable members of the host community while the rest are returnee families.

The success of ongoing activities shows the possibility of scalable, cost-effective house reconstruction in direct support of durable solutions.

After six years in displacement, many families from Sinjar district are planning to return to their area of origin. The International Organization for Migration (IOM) Iraq, with support from the U.S. Department of State - Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration (PRM), supported 1,400 families with cash assistance. The IOM Iraq also provided necessary equipment to the Mayor's office to facilitate the return process.
