Iraqi-born Australian Army soldier returns to Iraq with TG Taji

Australian Army soldier, Corporal Fadi Jabbori, grew up in Iraq before his family fled the war-torn country for Australia in 1995. Now, almost 25 years later, the infantry section commander has returned to his birth country on deployment with the ninth rotation of Task Group Taji as a trainer and mentor.

"Every day in Iraq has a memorable feeling for me," Jabbori said. "I'm honored to return to my place of birth. To help rebuild, mentor and assist the Iraqi Army."

During the training, military working dogs Jeck and Maike worked on their attacks in bite work drills, ran through an agility course and completed an explosives identification drill.

Utilizing patrol explosive detector dogs allows service members to identify the presence of explosives designed to cause disruption to operations within Combined Joint Task Force – Operation Inherent Resolve areas of operation.

Coalition forces with TF Iraq conduct training for ISF intelligence section

Task Force-Iraq's multinational Intelligence Advise and Assist Team (IA2T) completed an intelligence course for trainees at the Joint Operations Command - Iraq headquarters.

The students, comprised of Iraqi general officers and colonels from the Iraqi Security Force's intelligence section, trained for three weeks with the Coalition instructors on a range of topics such as the FE3AD (Find, Fix, Finish, Exploit, Analyze, and Disseminate) process, methods of targeting, target value analysis, target lists, and targeting effects.

The training brought Iraqi intelligence officers from operations centers across Iraq to one location to share their best methods and techniques for developing the intelligence.

"All these countries have come together to give their support," said Iraqi staff Maj. Gen. Jamal Mazeal Tahir, chairman of intelligence for the Joint Operations Command – Iraq. "Each has experience and different skills and works to transfer those skills to those who need them. Coordination is very important between all the countries represented here."
